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An update on Online Australia Day


Friday 27 November 1998

s you probably know, Online Australia Day will be staged nationally on Friday 27 November 1998 and will increase the awareness among the general community and business of the benefits of going online. Online Australia Day is a major initiative of the Australian Government which is being developed and co-ordinated by the National Office for the Information Economy (NOIF).

Online Australia Day will bring the community together online through a 'Virtual Expo' website and a series of community events staged around Australia.

This is a great opportunity for libraries to promote their online services to their local communities and to demonstrate the key importance of public access. Many libraries around Australia are becoming part of the day by organising their own local events.

Examples of events arranged by libraries include: internet training and display classes aimed at specific sectors of the community (for example, the elderly); virtual morning or afternoon teas, internet displays; and links to online activities in other libraries across the country.



Libraries are encouraged to use the official Online Australia Day website as part of their event, as this site will include a range of high-quality and live content on the day. A range of marketing material — posters, postcards and Online Australia Guides is being provided to libraries participating in the day.
