n 9 October, the recruitment campaign was launched for Volunteers 2000 — the volunteer program for the Olympic and Paralympic Games. Australians were asked to register their interest to volunteer at the Sydney 2000 Games.

What volunteer roles are there?

Main Press Centre research and information service — to provide a high quality responsive service for print journalists. You will need the ability to respond quickly and effectively to tight deadlines and deal with journalists under pressure. Reference abilities will be important.

Main Press Centre Help Desk — to provide a high quality information desk service for print journalists. Ability to work under pressure, to tight deadlines and a "can do" flexible attitude are essential.

Olympic Village — the clients are 10 000 elite athletes and 5000 officials; there are three integrated services — recreational library/reading room, music listening centre, Sydney 2000 Games video replay service. Good client service, general reference and audio visual skills will be useful here.

Volunteers must meet the following minimum requirements: commitment to a high customer service standard; ability to speak and read english; willingness and availability to attend interviews and training sessions; willingness to work a minimum of ten days; successful security background check; agreement to wear the Olympic and Paralympic Games uniform; responsibility for travel to and accommodation in Sydney or interstate city as appropriate; and minimum of eighteen years of age at the time of the Games

Aurora Leadership Institute 1999

he third Aurora Leadership Institute will be held 11-16 February 1999. Aurora is a six-day residential program open to information professionals.

The program, presented by Schreiber Shannon Associates, is designed to identify and develop potential leaders in our industry. Up to thirty-two participants will be selected to attend from nominees who have: successful employment experience of between three and ten years; proven leadership potential and the ability to share with others their vision and enthusiasm for the future of services in the information industry; and excellent communication

Nominees will be required to provide: a one page resume, including current position and contact details (phone, fax, e-mail); a one page statement of career goals, achievements and expectations of the Aurora Leadership Institute; and a one or two page letter of recommendation from a supervisor or someone who knows the nominee's work well.

The participants will be selected by the Aurora Advisory Committee established by the AIMA Board of Directors. This committee consists of Warren Horton, chairman of the Board of Directors of AIMA and director general of the National Library of Australia, Brenda McConchie, executive director of AIMA, and a previous Aurora participant.

The cost of the program, which covers all program activities, accommodation and meals is \$2500. Successful applicants will be advised of detailed arrangements in December.
