Local history goes global with new discussion group

he Social Sciences Section of the IFLA Division of Special Libraries held a preparatory meeting to form an international discussion group on genealogy and local history at the IFLA Conference in Amsterdam on 16 August 1998. The meeting was facilitated by Mel Thatcher, acquisitions librarian for Asian and Pacific materials of the Society of Genealogists, Salt Lake City, Utah. Also in attendance was Mr Brent Griffiths, director of the Society's library.

Nine countries, including Australia, Germany, Japan, the Netherlands, Russia, the United Kingdom and the United States of America, were represented and sufficient signatures were obtained from associations represented to form a discussion group. I was the only representative from Australia.

Librarians who provide family and local history services and other interested persons are invited to participate in this discussion group, the formal name of which is the Family and Local History Discussion Group.

Under the auspices of IFLA a virtual discussion group will be created on IFLANET. A meeting will be organised for for IFLA '99 in Bangkok at which national reports for the Asia/Pacific regions will be presented. A workshop on reference services has been

proposed for the IFLA 2000 conference in Jerusalem. There is a possibility that the theme for the open papers session of the Social Sciences Section (jointly with the Geography and Map Section) will be genealogical services in libraries.
