## High university honour for state librarian

agmar Schmidmaier, state librarian and chief executive at the State library of New South Wales was one of six notable Australians to be awarded honorary degrees by the University of New South Wales.

Mrs Schmidmaier received an honorary Doctorate of Letters at the university's Jubilee ceremony on Friday 19 March. Chancellor, the Hon Sir Anthony Mason presented the doctorate.

Mrs Schmidmaier, who holds a Masters of Librarianship from the university as well as a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Sydney, has maintained close links with the university. In 1997 she initiated the State Library's Metcalfe Scholarship to advance the profession of librarianship, and the university's Asia-Australia Institute's Seminars are held at the State Library.

Prior to her appointment as state librarian and chief executive in 1995, Mrs Schmidmaier held senior academic and managerial positions in the fields of technology and information systems, education and librarianship.

Mrs Schmidmaier also worked as a consultant to national and international organisations, was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship in 1988/89, and served on an OECD working group on the quality of learning in distance education.

She is widely acknowledged among librarians and information professionals for her knowledge and skill in planning and managing computerised systems for the organisation and dissemination of knowledge.

Public committees on which she currently serves include the New South Wales Board of Studies; the New South Wales selection committee for the 'Face of Australia' stamp series; the Australian Academic and Research Libraries editorial board; the Australian Libraries Copyright Committee and the Council of Australian State Libraries.

Commenting on the award of her honorary degree, Mrs Schmidmaier said: 'I am excited and honoured to be recognised for my professional contributions at this time in my career.'
