

## Celebrating two million items

n exhibition of 'defining moments' was a novel way of illustrating the power of a library's collection over individual lives, at Adelaide's Barr Smith Library on 30 April.

The exhibition formed part of a gala celebration the library staged to mark the acquisition of its two-millionth volume. More than 300 people were wined, dined and entertained in the Barr's opulent Reading Room, one of the finest examples of library reading rooms in the Southern Hemisphere

A feature of the evening was forty Adelaide celebrities sharing their 'defining moments'— a poem, novel, textbook, music score, film script— that signalled a change in their lives. Celebrities such as food identity, Maggie Beer; Harry Watt (of the George Gross & Harry Who Fashion Label); film-maker, Scott Hicks (*Shine, Snow Falling on Cedars*); astronaut, Andy Thomas; and Southcorp chairman, Rick Allert, illustrated the point that libraries can, and do, change lives.

On view during the evening were a selection of interesting and rare items from the library's collection, and a selection of exquisite black and white photographs, depicting scenes throughout the library.

New York Nowhere, the final poem of Geoffrey Dutton, who died late last year, was given the honour of being the two-millionth item added to the collection.

'It was appropriate to select this work for many reasons', university librarian, Ray Choate, said. 'It is a beautifully produced limited edition in a multi-media format, enabling us to represent the print to digitisation parallels of past, present and future. Also significant is that Dutton, a South Australian, was for some years a member of the University of Adelaide's English Department.'

A highlight of the celebration was the performance by a string quartet of an arrangement by South Australia's composer-in-residence, Graeme Koehne, who was present in the audi-

ence. To his servant Bach, God grants a final glimpse: The morning star was a piece inspired when Koehne read that Bach, who had gone blind, regained his sight briefly at the end of his life.

Another highlight was a short talk by emeritus university librarian, Ira Raymond, who was able to recount the experience of the library achieving its 500 000 item and one-millionth item during his productive tenure of growing the early collection.

Now the biggest library in South Australia, the Barr Smith is the first to acknowledge there are formidable challenges ahead to maintain the collection. It has launched three bequest funds covering: digitisation projects, the fabric of the building and the acquisition of new research and study materials. The Library is experiencing a steady flow of private and corporate donations earmarked for special projects within these three funds.

'There has been an encouraging response to this promotion. We are discovering that people are nostalgic about their days of 'reading at the Barr' and are willing to give back in philanthropic gestures,' Ray said.
