University library to honour Alfred Deakin

A unique collection of books, portraits, sketches, photographs, cartoons, film footage, film commentaries and other memorabilia of Alfred Deakin are being brought together in Geelong. The collection, the Alfred Deakin Prime Ministerial Library, will be housed at the Woolstores campus of the Deakin University. It is a huge project which has drawn together the resources of archives and museums.

The library is tipped to become a key research tool and tourist drawcard. It will also form the basis of travelling exhibitions, an internet site and multi-media products.

Library chief warns on internet censorship by Jim Dickins, The Canberra Times, 14 May

Warren Horton, director-general of the National Library of Australia, warned during his Australian Library Week Oration that the Federal Government moves to censor the internet may undermine the new medium, just as it begins to fulfil its liberating potential. He said that the Government's Broadcasting Services Amendment Bill was fixated on controlling the internet at a time when policy should be focussed on harnessing its

Warren said that censorship raised issues of intellectual freedom and tended to focus on the narrow question of controlling pornography. He said that calls to restrict access to 'unsuitable' material on the internet missed the point that this information was already freely available in libraries in print

Keeper of culture

Daphne Guinness spends a day with the retiring director-general of the National Library of Australia, described as the high priest of online cultural information. She describes the National Library as 'a place awash with computers, hardly a volume in sight.' He is a keeper of paintings, maps, manuscripts and papers too, and invites the reporter to Canberra to show her Billy Hughes's teeth.

According to Guinness, Warren has done more than anyone to lift the profile of the National Library and steer it into the new information age. The controversial Kinetica project is an example of this.

Coast tops the state in reading

Gold Coast libraries have recorded more visits per capita than any other city in Queensland, according to the Library Board of Queensland. The average citizen makes ten visits per year to the library. Joy Webster, acting library services manager puts this down to the range of services offered by the libraries — CDs, cassettes, videos, computer services, internet access, magazines, the daily papers, reference material and photocopiers.

Turning boys to books

There is evidence to suggest that boys and school do not mix. Literacy levels are significantly lower for boys than girls. However, identifying the problem is one thing, what do do about it is another.

Debbie Epstien is an associate of the Centre for Research and Education of Gender at the Institute of Education, University of London. Her book Failing boys: Issues in gender and achivement, suggests that the public reaction to the idea that boys are failing may be linked to the notion of the place of boys and the roles they have fulfilled as

One of the areas she considers essential in an understanding of boys' success at school is related to conceptions of their own masculinity.

One of the main ideas as to why boys do not read as much as girls is because they do not see men reading or involved in bookish activities - male role-models in schools are few and far between.

Review of library grants scheme well underway Kilcoy Sentinel, 1 April 1999

The review of the Queensland Public Library Grant Scheme, administered by the State Library of Queensland, is well underway. The Scheme distributes more than \$17 million to 121 local governments in Queensland through cash grants, and the provision of a Country Lending Service and centralised services.

The review process will concentrate on: how the grant is spent; the impact of technology and the related issues of connectivity, content and training; bookstock acquisition standards; services to indigenous communities; and the rising community demand for library services.

The recommendations from the review, expected in October, will help shape the future of the public library network in Queensland according to Queensland state librarian, Des Stephens.

Art purchases open to public scrutiny: Foss by Anne Burns, *The West Australian*, 14 April

Political interference in major acquisitions by the WA Art Galley and Museum would be exposed to public scrutiny under legislation before State Parliament.

If an arts minister acted against the advice of the gallery or museum advisory boards that advice would have to be tabled in both houses of parliament under the legislation.

The legislation establishing the minister as the 'owner' of the state collections of the art galley, the museum and the Library and Information Services of WA has been criuticised by arts groups and the State oppposition for giving too much power to the minister. Mr Foss stated that the legislation carried a safeguard that the boards of the three bodies would remain guardians of the collections.

Storing e-data for e-ternity

The Public Record Office of Victoria was faced with a delemma when the Victorian Government committed itself to becoming 'paperless' — how to keep track of the many and varied computer systems around the state in the hope of storing the information they contained.

In April the Victorian Electronic Records Strategy (VERS) was launched to address the long-term e-data preservation needs of the state.

The strategy involves capturing electronic documents at the point of creation using Adobe's Portable Document Format (PDF).

Metadata is expressed using eXtensible Markup Language (XML). The team who developed the stragtegy chose PDF and XML because the standards are freely available and open. It was also felt that although the

formats may not be used by future generations it will be easy to track down the information needed to create a PDF viewer.

Towards 2000 with a \$9m library by Ben Hooper, *The Advertiser*, 21 April

A \$9 million upgrade to the Burnside library and community centre was recently approved. The upgrade plans — including a village green, multi-purpose atrium and coffee shop — were approved by the council after more than two hours debate.

The manager of the library was delighted with the decision. She said that more than seventy percent of the popultion are registered borrowers and about 1000 people visited the library every day.

Work on the project is due to begin in January 2000 and the target completion date is April 2001.

Librarians take on role of internet teachers The Canberra Chronicle, 13 April

The ACT government recently launched an innovative internet training centre at Griffith library. The new centre was established as a result of customer demand for consistent, professional and quality training.

Brendan Smyth, ACT Urban Services Minister, said that people were keen to be taught by librarians because 'they are skilled in explaining to people how to access information in plain, easy to understand language'.

Courses to be offed at the centre are 'Introduction to the internet'; 'Searching the internet effectively'; and 'Using electronic mail effectively'.

Eros hops into bed with anti-porn senators by Lauren Martin, *The Sydney Morning Herald*, 4 May
