Restructure a major focus in Queensland

major focus of the Queensland Branch in 1999 was the suggestion that the branch split in two — Northern Queensland and Southern Queensland. A ballot was held, and a recommendation that the branch be split was taken to the October General Council meeting. General Council has referred the matter to the Divisional Restructure Subcommittee of the Renewal Working Group.

Both Public Libraries Section and RAISS have been revitalised, and both are enjoying good support, with enthusiastic committees and a good program of events. Local History and the Children's and Youth Services Sections are also emerging.

Queensland Branch was very keen to ensure institutional interests should be represented, and three new positions on Branch were created to incorporate school, public and academic libraries. Some very successful professional development events have been held, including an electronic licensing seminar which was presented in Brisbane and Cairns by Victorian colleagues; a breakfast featuring psychologist Ian Plowman; and a reception for new graduates. There has also been a session on ethics and a seminar about the Digital Agenda Bill. Quill continues its highly successful run, and is being published ten times this year. It is a very important vehicle for communicating with members.

We are very proud to have two award winners: Library Technician of the Year, Helen Pickers, and joint Library Manager of the Year, Janine Schmidt. Helen received her award in Perth at the Library Technician's Conference, and Janine's presentation was held late November.
