Jan is a library technician who has an outstanding record for performance over and above expected output. Jan has been a positive influence on staff.

The second category 'Northern Territory Library and Information Service Community Award' recognises outstanding contribution to the promotion and delivery of library and information service to the Northern Territory com-

The Australasian virtual engineering library

n Saturday, 8 July 2000, the president of the Institution of Engineers, Australia, Martin Cole, launched a website (http://avel.edu.au) designed to revolutionise access to high quality IT and engineering information.

The Australasian Virtual Engineering Library (AVEL) is a gateway designed to help engineers and information technology professionals save time and find relevant information on the web quickly. It provides free access to over 2000 quality Australasian information sources. AVEL has been developed through a unique partnership between the library community and the engineering academic and professional communities scattered across Australia.

Associate Professor David Radcliffe from the Mechanical Engineering Department of the University of Queensland is the leader of the group that has created this virtual library.

'AVEL is a dynamic virtual research space with its integrated structure, incorporating a database of quality and reliable engineering and IT resources, a list of conferences in the Australasian region, employment listings, and access to full-text theses. An online bookshop covering engineering, IT and latest web resources in

relevant fields is also included.' Professor Radcliffe explained.

'You can search or browse AVEL. For example, you can look up manufacturing or software engineering or search for a conference on software security and access resources which have been hand-picked, indexed using metadata and updated by librarians and industry experts,' Professor Radcliffe added.

AVEL is a collaborative initiative involving the Universities of Queensland, New South Wales, Melbourne and Monash, Queensland University of Technology, the Centre for Mining Technology and Equipment (CMTE), the CRC for Enterprise Distributed Systems Technology and the Institution of Engineers, Australia.

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
