## Library software wins awards for Australian developer

ibrary software developer Softlink began in a rented house in the outer Brisbane suburb of Eight Mile Plains in 1983. By 1999 the company was exporting to 85 countries on six continents with systems in use in more than 8300 libraries and in eight languages.

In these sixteen short years Softlink had moved several times seeking adequate working space. These included moves into Brisbane's CBD and finally out to the suburban commercial areas in Shailer Park and Springwood.

Such growth also led to the establishment of Softlink companies in the United Kingdom, the United States of America, India, Hong Kong, and New Zealand. Distribution agencies have also been established in Iceland, Malaysia, Japan and China.

Queensland recognised such home grown excellence with the 1999 Premier of Queensland's Award for Export Achievement: Information Industries.

This is of real significance to the world of libraries and information in that such specialist library software won such a prestigious award. The award was open to every information technology and communications company in Queensland.

Softlink next won the much sought after 'Australian Export Award: Information Industries' for 1999. This award recognises outstanding export achievement in the field of information technology, interactive media and multimedia, and communications products and services. Considering the scope of industries covered by this award, the depth of expertise in these fields in Australia, and the resultant product appeal to export markets, Softlink's library software win is momentous.

Australia's relatively small population, and the demand for excellence in leadingedge information technology systems from a highly-trained professional library sector, have together created a competitive development environment. Softlink's library software products OASIS and AfW (Alice for Windows) have been forged in this environment to such an extent that they can be found around the world.

Softlink's software is multi-lingual and currently supports English, Chinese, Japanese, Thai, Vietnamese, French, Spanish, and Malay languages. The programming challenges inherent with languages other than English are being met, with the development of AfW to support Hebrew.

Softlink's staff must be acknowledged through these awards. It is significant that both library professionals and information technology professionals work together on the development of Softlink's products. And yes, Softlink's library professionals are true professionals in being members of their respective library associations, whether ALIA, LIANZ or BLA.
