The collection will be housed in the special collections room at the Footscray Park campus in thirty custommade bookcases, built by Mr Verril.

A busy year on the books

Diamond Valley News, 6 September

Library chief executive officer and regional manager, Craig Anderson said that the library service is one of the busiest in Australia and is continuing to grow and expand each year.

Councillor Peter Williams said that the increase was due to the library's commitment to matching stocks to demand, with almost 8000 new items added to the library collections.
