## Personalities unmasked at the State Library of South Australia

n an ironic twist on the masks' purpose of disguise, identities from around Australia have taken the opportunity of a mask decorating event to reveal, rather than conceal.

More than 100 figures from the worlds of wine, food, fashion, the media, sport, literature, the arts, politics and more, decorated a mask in their own image, or with intriguing, personal messages.

'Library unmasked' was organised by the State Library Foundation (South Australia) to raise funds for its imaginative 'Wine literature of the world' project. The full 'mask-erade' of work-of-art masks were on exhibition before being auctioned.

The characteristics of each mask uniquely convey the persona of the decorators, for example:

Emmy award winning director, **Scott Hicks** had a simple but compelling idea for his mask — he painted it gold, like an Oscar. While *Shine* won an Oscar for his leading actor, Geoffrey Rush, Hicks clearly still has dreams for one of his own.

Television identity **Andrew Daddo** painted his mask with a seaside theme, with his face in the water and his head in the clouds.

**Tim Ferguson** reveals the familiar, wacky, child-like nature that we know from the Doug Anthony Allstars and 'Don't forget your toothbrush'.

John and Roz Moriarity of Balarinji Designs decorated their mask in indigenous Australian designs, closely resembling the international jumbo jet they painted.

The State Library of South Australia's 'Wine literature of the world' project, for which the funds are being raised, will uniquely showcase the library's outstanding wine literature collection. The collection features items dating back to the 11th century, ranging from rare books through to thousands of wine labels and contemporary works covering almost every wine producing region of the world.

The project will help mount a selection of the glorious treasures in a permanent exhibition, which will also feature interactive, multimedia components. The project will also involve digitising highlights of the world-class collection for a world 'wine' website.
