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Borchardt Library \$5.1 million re-development

New era of service delivery

he Borchardt Library at La Trobe University Bundoora campus in Melbourne has recently completed a \$5.1 million refurbishment, taking it into a new era in service provision with a dynamically modern look.

Up to 8000 people use the building each day, and a growing demand for access to computers and audio-visual materials continues without any diminution of the demand for print materials. Chief librarian, Earle Gow, said that this is

the first major re-development of the Borchardt Library since Stage III of the building was completed in 1986. It provides students and staff with substantially improved services and facilities for teaching and research.

The project was required in order to accommodate the pressures from the closures of two university campuses and the resulting increase in library use at Bundoora. It also takes into account some important trends in library service delivery:

- the preference for flexible, multi-purpose computer workstations, demand for which is expected to increase dramatically in the next five years;
- the need for network access and power points for clients wishing to use their own

laptop computers in the library; and

• the trend towards student centred learning, requiring the library to provide more group study facilities.

The architects and contractors were considerably challenged by the decision to undertake the project during the busy academic year. Collections of materials, staff offices, service points and the front entrance itself, were all moved, and later replaced, and construction was undertaken in stages to minimise disruptions. Staff and clientele proved to be both flexible and forgiving.

The refurbished floor has maintained its spaciousness, successfully blending the old with the new, while introducing a dynamic colour scheme to the library.

A new look for Orana

The ALIA journal of school and children's librarianship

here is a new look this year for *Orana*, the refereed journal of the Children's and Youth Services Section and the School Libraries Section of ALIA. A new editor has been appointed and the journal has a new format.

After considerable discussion the Orana Advisory Committee, chaired by Dr Alison Gregg, decided to restructure the position of editor and create two positions an issue editor and a production editor. The issue editor's prime responsibility is to commission articles, arranging for the refereeing of articles submitted, and to copy edit and proofread. The production editor is responsible for the provision of production services including computer formatting and design, printing and distribution; these services are currently outsourced. The production editor is also responsible for overall financial management.

The position of issue editor was advertised nationally at the end of 1999 and attracted a strong field of applicants. Margaret Steinberger was selected, bringing to the position a strong background in teacher-librarianship, writing and editing. Margaret was a teacher-librarian for over twenty-seven years in charge of large secondary school libraries and for fifteen years was a contracted book reviewer for the *Newcastle Herald* and SCAN. She has qualifications in freelance journalism, and book editing and publishing, and is currently editing/ghost writing the autobiography of a prominent Sydney businesswoman. Shirley Campbell, a member of the Advisory Committee since the early 1990s, is the production editor.

The journal is now A4 and the cover will provide an upmarket, vibrant image which we hope readers will find interesting and inviting.
