PsycArticles available to researchers through Ovid Technologies

Through a new licensing agreement between the American Psychological Association (APA) and Ovid Technologies, PsycARTICLES database of more than 25 000 articles from leading psychology journals will be available through Journals@Ovid, the fully searchable database of scientific, medical and technical journals used by academic institutions and corporations worldwide.

PsycARTICLES provides electronic fulltext of articles from forty-two journals published by APA and allied organisations and is a complement to APA's popular PsycINFO database. It includes a range of authoritative, peer-reviewed journals covering basic scientific research and applied, clinical and theoretical studies in psychology. The 25 000 available through articles currently PsycARTICLES were published from 1988 to the present.

PsycARTICLES features full-text links to abstracts in the PsycINFO database. Subscribers are able to integrate PsycINFO and PsycARTICLES into a fully searchable package. Citations of other studies in the text and reference sections of PsycARTICLES documents link either to full text or to complete bibliographic information in PsycINFO or in other databases.

RoweCom agrees to be acquired by divine

RoweCom Inc, a global provider of e-commerce solutions for the purchasing and managing of print and e-content knowledge resources, announced recently that it has signed a letter of intent to be acquired by divine, inc.

divine, inc is an enterprise solutions company delivering a unique combination of services, web-based technology, and managed applications capabilities.

Post acquisition, RoweCom and its man-

agement team will continue RoweCom's commitment to its core library and desktop services while developing additional services.

RoweCom Australia managing director, Ms Janette Wright, said the acquisition would not impact greatly on the day-to-day business of RoweCom Australia. 'As far as we are aware, there are no immediate plans or changes for RoweCom. The merger will mean RoweCom will be a division of a company with strengths in the internet software development area,' said Ms Wright.

Customers to benefit

from new library system

Port Phillip Library will streamline processes and enhance online services when its new Spydus software system is launched.

Customers will benefit from this new efficiency which is inherent in the comprehensive functionality of Spydus, from Sanderson Australia, according to the library's information technology co-ordinator, Sara Wisnia.

Port Phillip is the first library in Australia to install Version 6.3 of Spydus, which includes a new circulation graphical user interface (GUI).

Port Phillip required a new system when its hardware became redundant. Seizing the opportunity to evaluate both hardware and software, the library sought to take advantage of increased online possibilities.

Management consulted stakeholders including users, staff and council, checked with other councils and prepared a comprehensive tender document. The key criterion for a new system was functionality, from both the public and staff points of view.

Port Phillip staff are looking forward to going online, convinced during their training that the system will introduce new efficiencies. They have been impressed by Spydus' functionality and look forward to using the system.

Port Phillip Library will run Spydus on its Sun Solaris server, through Council's Novell local area network. The library's five branches will communicate via a 64K link. Spydus will be accessible via thirty-five staff terminals, sixteen public catalogues and the world wide web.

A forward-thinking, widely used community facility, Port Phillip Library has 50 000 borrowers and 250 000 items on its catalogue. It issues about one million items a year. The library is keen to promote the accessibility of its diverse offerings and relishes the challenge of providing new services.
