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Library interiors — the inside story

Bridging the gap between design and functionality is the focus of a two-day forum to be held in Melbourne on Monday 4 and Tuesday 5 February 2002.

he State Library of Victoria Board forum, *Library interiors* — the inside story, will draw on the knowledge of architectural and design professionals who have a good understanding of the needs of libraries and other public facilities.

Case studies and a workshop session will provide practical advice about the 'do's' and 'don'ts' of library interiors relevant to all library sectors.

One of the forum presenters, Cecelia Kugler, has recently presented a paper at the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) Building conference in Boston. Her paper explored how demands for new services and access can conflict with the traditional collections and accommodation of expanding hard-copy collections.

At Library interiors — The inside story she will present three case studies, of one public and two academic libraries, to look at the impact of these changes and how they have shaped the libraries' particular priorities and outcomes.

Planning for the future has become critical in an age where technological possibilities are endless, she said, but must always be kept in balance with the more important human and social dimensions.

Academic library spaces are being called 'Hybraries' or 'Cybraries', reflecting the

changing nature of their services, which as well as managing and storing print resources, also provide access to a variety of electronic resources. University of Melbourne manager of planning and projects, Karen Kealy, said academic libraries must be designed with 'the flexibility to cope with changing demands,' which include 'traditional print-based resources, multi-media and electronic materials, providing for traditional study spaces, spaces for teaching, access to computers and collaborative learning facilities.'

Manager of buildings and facilities at the State Library of Victoria, Stuart Pickering, said the conference aims to provide councillors, local government CEO's, library managers and design consultants with information about the practical aspects of library design.

'Libraries need to provide spaces that not only look good but are flexible, functional, affordable and sustainable. The forum will assist information providers to work with design professionals to achieve this balance,' he said.

Other topics for discussion will include: the future of library design, interior design principles, space planning, creating flexible spaces, signage, working with heritage buildings, creating teenage spaces, and occupational health and safety.
