

Opportunities for employment

The South Australian Public Sector Graduate Program

t the first meeting for the 2002 ALIA Group Mentoring Program on Tuesday 12 February at University of South Australia City West campus, the guest speaker was Helen Hennessy, principal consultant of the Public Sector Management Act Policy and Advice Unit for the Office of the Commissioner for Public Employment (OCPE). The theme for the night was Investigating opportunities for employment.

Helen spoke specifically on the South Australian Public Sector Graduate Program, and the role it plays in giving recent library and information graduates the opportunity to utilise their skills. The graduate program is based on a twelve-month placement in a government department. Successful candidates are encouraged to seek ongoing, permanent employment within the public sector.

Graduates bring a vast range of skills, knowledge and experience to the government, and this is beneficial to the public sector as well as to the graduate. 'They bring a fresh pair of eyes to the department', Helen said, which allows other employees to gain something from the graduate. In turn, the graduate gains experience in the field by hands-on work, and from the vast experience, expertise and knowledge of the fellow staff. Graduates are encouraged to attend various meetings, conferences and other gatherings where they can network with librarians from various fields and continue to learn.

The only pre-requisite to apply for the program is a minimum three-year degree or diploma from a university. In relation to graduate librarians, Helen said the OCPE,


Recent as well as past graduates are encouraged to apply, no matter when you completed your study, your age or cultural background. The public sector encourages diversity as their client base is often diverse itself. At least twelve State government departments use the graduate program. Helen also spoke of the importance of a professional resumé with specific details of experience, and reliable referees, who should always be contacted by applicants to ensure they are prepared.

The graduate program allows library students to utilise their referencing capabilities, gain experience in such elements as cataloguing and classifying, report writing, customer service, communications and other skills. The program is an invaluable resource in gaining an exciting and rewarding career in the public sector, and one which all current and former students should investigate.

which manages the program, look for a diverse range of skills and knowledge, such as information management skills as well as library background. Applicants should gain as much background on the organisation as possible, for example searching the web, looking at annual reports, and asking people in the field. This will help applicants better prepare for the interview by having questions to ask the panel, which Helen said is important and shows planning and professionalism. Rehearsing the interview can also be beneficial, and help calm nerves and gain confidence for the
