Kalgoorlie Miner, 9 February 2002

The latest initiative of the JS Battye Library of West Australian History will ensure that the Kalgoorlie race riots of 1934 will never be forgotten. The Western Australian Migrant Communities Archive has been established to collect and preserve the history of migration and migrant communities. Records of ethnic and community organisations including correspondence, minute books, and photographs will be preserved, together with letters and correspondence about the migration experience, personal diaries, and photographs of family and home life.

Not just books for our new librarian *Ballarat Courier*, 5 February 2002, by Andrew Molloy

Julie Ray, the new chief executive officer of the Central Highlands Regional Library Corporation wants to take the library beyond the traditional view of what libraries offer. She wants people coming into the library to make it 'an extension of their lounge-room.' Julie is also keen to introduce new technology, providing it improves the service to library users.

Providing access to information: Library new weapon in war on drugs

Western Advocate, 1 February 2002, by Adam Joyce

Bathurst library will be part of a state-wide scheme to tackle drug abuse. The Bathurst City Council has endorsed the participation of its library in the State Library of New South Wales' 'Drug information in public libraries' project. The project aims to increase the public's access to quality information on illicit drugs. The drug information project will provide free to each participating library a set of print resources on drug information, access to an internet gateway of Australian drug information, staff training in drug information resources and services, promotional materials, and ongoing support and reference backup for drug information.

Library needs more qualified staff Caloundra City News, 1 February 2002

A Library Board of Queensland evaluation re-

port on Caloundra Library has recommended the employment of additional qualified staff and the redevelopment of the library. The review team said that the need for a new, much bigger building was of prime importance. Caloundra libraries provide significantly higher loans per capita than state averages, have a smaller than desirable ratio of staff to loans, and have a higher than average acquisition rate.

Matthew Flinders exhibition opens at Churchill Island

Phillip Island and San Remo Advertiser, 31 January 2002

Matthew Flinders: the ultimate voyage, an exhibition co-ordinated by the West Gippsland Regional Library Corporation and Phillip Island Nature Park to mark the bicentenary of Flinder's epic circumnavigation of Australia, opens at the Churchill Island Visitor Centre on 6 February.

Library targeting young readers Border Chronicle, 31 January 2002

Tammie Porter, manager of the Bordertown Public Library believes revolutionary changes are needed to attract young people to country libraries. The library has started offering additional activities for its youngest users; the next challenge is to introduce changes for the 10 to 18 year olds. Ms Porter wants the library's role to extend beyond information provider for this age group. The wish list includes lounge suites and a coffee bar or the teenage area, and the library is also investigating the use of eBooks. Ms Porter is also considering inviting guest speakers of interest to students as well as more frequent meetings with school librarians.

There's more to Aussies than sport
North Eastern Advertiser, 31 January 2002

The latest census figures reveal that 38.1 per cent of Australians visit libraries. They also reveal that eight-eight per cent of men and more than eighty-two per cent of women read newspapers. More than nine million Australians above the age of ten regularly use a computer and of those, forty-seven per cent regularly access the internet.

School's in — online Australian PC World, 1 February 2002, by Deanne McIntosh

A review of material available on the net for primary and secondary students. Also included in the three-page report are some tips for advanced searching. Deanne encourages parents to assist children to evaluate the information they find on the net by comparing it to more reputable sites, textbooks, or asking their teachers for clarification.

The issue of net privacy is also touched upon. She advises parents to help kids to protect their privacy by explaining what in-

formation needs to be kept private and what parents would be happy for the kids to reveal about themselves.

Ruling rattles the copyright routine The Age, 29 January 2002, by Sue Cant

Lawyer Steve White has warned software developers that the routine of copying computer specifications can constitute a breach of copyright. Copyright exists in source, object code, and specifications.

Yahoo! introduces pay-per-article The Australian, 29 January 2002, by Barbara Gengler

Yahoo! has introduced a fee-based search feature giving customers access to reference reports, news and authoritative content. The new feature will allow users to search a library of more than seventy million pages of full-text. Consumers can also purchase reference reports and access archived news from more than sixty newswires. Yahoo! will make the service available through an agreement with enterprise service provider divine.

Most in favour of porn ban/X-rated e-males

The Sunday Times (Perth) / The Sunday Telegraph (Sydney), 27 January 2002

SurfControl Australia commissioned University of Western Sydney academics Monica Whitty and Ray Archee to research attitudes to e-mail content. The research showed that approximately seventy-five per cent of Australian workers believe access to pornography via the internet, and sexually explicit e-mail should be banned in the work-place. Charles

Heunemann, managing director or SurfControl said that employees who swapped sexual stories on e-mail risked offending other employees and contravening company policy and sexual harassment laws.

Censorship laws keep strength: McGinty West Australian, 23 January 2002, by Daniel Clery

Abolishing the WA Censorship Advisory Committee will not weaken the state's censorship laws according to Attorney-General Jim McGinty. Mr McGinty announced plans to scrap its publication censorship regime in favour of joining a national scheme. Mr. McGinty said that the state already operated under national guidelines for movies and video games and it made sense to extend this system to publications.

Mobile libraries bring satellite links to the bush

The Upper Murrary Regional Library's two mobile libraries now carry new satellite technology which will bring a real-time library service to outlying communities. The system allows for the transfer of data in any location throughout the 28 211sq km covered by the library. No matter where the mobile is within the region, the library can provide an internet service. The technology will also allow the mobile libraries to provide real-time access to the library's management system. The eighteen-month trial of the technology has been funded by a \$145 000 grant from the Federal government's Networking the Nation program.

Alston's X files: the secret truth about internet censorship

Sydney Morning Herald, 21 January 2001, by Lauren Martin

Two years after the online censorship laws that came into effect on 1 January 2000 the government still won't reveal what it has banned. It won't even reveal what it finds acceptable. The Australian Broadcasting Authority refuses to disclose or describe what its five public servants and several million taxpayer dollars are protecting us from. Unlike the Office of Film and Literature Classification which posts notices of which magazines, films, books and games have been restricted and why, the Australian Broadcasting Authority has stated that the public interest in keeping this information secret 'clearly outweighs any public interest' in community review.

Booking the future

Courier Mail, 19 January 2002

A new era is beginning for the State Library of Queensland which celebrates its centenary this year. Work will begin late this year on the Millennium Library Project which will expand the library's South bank site. The Queensland Government has endorsed a new future directions policy for the 'smart library' with a focus on web design, training strategies, and partnerships with community and business. Under the new policy, the library will work with local communities to develop a 'smart library network' of physical and virtual links to information and training.

Library service funding shortfalls must be addressed ... and soon!

Moyne Gazette, 16 January 2001

The director of Moyne Shire's community services, Meg Baker, has said that if funding issues are not constructively addressed libraries services will be threatened. While the situation in Corangamite Regional Library Corporation is not unique, librarians are saying that the problem facing municipal libraries, particularly those serving rural populations, is that over the same years that libraries have been changing to become more than a place to borrow books, the State government subsidies have been reducing.

\$74 000 grant brings library on-line Moree Champion, 15 January 2002

A NSW government grant of almost \$74 000

will go towards the placement of the Northern Regional Library's catalogue on the web. Regional library manager, Grant White, said that this would enable anyone with internet access on their computer at home, school or elsewhere to obtain information at a much quicker than ever.

It's online or the breadline, say gurus *The Sunday Age*, 13 January 2002, by Melissa Marino

A new form of poverty threatens the technologically illiterate and those who eschew online services. Experts now fear that those without internet access will be as disadvantaged as those without a car or phone. While research shows that most people use the internet for convenience rather than cost cutting, the trend online is to provide services to allow users to be information rich while also saving money.

Records reveal life in '70s

Archived Queensland State Cabinet records were released for public scrutiny in January. The records cover, amongst other things, the controversial Springboks Tour, the first Queensland government female pilot and the trial of daylight savings and provide insight into life under the Bjelke-Peterson government more than thirty years ago. Blinkered attitude on media law Daily Telegraph, 10 January 2002

The proposed changes to the laws governing

media ownership do not represent a liberalisation of current attitudes, but a continuation of the blinkered attitude that has restricted the growth of new media in Australia. The new legislation does allow for foreign control of media companies, if it is determined by the Foreign Investment Review Board to be in the national interest, and a relaxation of cross-media ownership laws.

ICAC drops library probe

In March 2001 councillors forwarded all file documents about the closure of the Drummoyne Library to ICAC and the Ombudsman. In particular, they wanted a review of the use of council funds to close the library. In a report to the council in December 2001, both ICAC and the Ombudsman indicated that they would not pursue the matter any further.

Sam Patane, chief executive of Insight Informatics, said that a group of twelve libraries in Saxony became a client of the Brisbane company in January.
