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

Keeping up with the times

Australian, 1 April, by Adrian Lynch

Thomson Gale has begun an ambitious two-

year project to digitise 200 years of back issues of *The Times*. Users of *The Times* digital archive will be able to print the articles, but won't be able to download the article in its original format for copyright reasons.

Web archives make history accessible *Australian*, 1 April, by Adrian Lynch

Adrian looks at the many digitisation projects being undertaken: from the national PictureAustralia archive, to local studies groups. He argues that digital imaging is protecting Australia's cultural estate for the use of present and future generations.

Uni first to print journals on e-press Australian, 1 April, by Diana Thorp

Monash University is establishing an electronic press. It is believed to be the first for an Australian university. The e-press will be used to publish journals and other academic resources online. There will be a selection process and quality controls: works for publication would go through the usual process for publishing. The e-press will be managed by the university library for a two-year trial period. Monash has committed \$700 000 towards the project.

Info-kids get the thumbs-up *Age*, 2 April, by Margaret Cook

Canadian academic Ronald Jobe calls them 'info-kids': they are usually male, physically active and good with their hands. They are often regarded as reluctant readers, but they love facts and information. Professor Jobe believes that parents and teachers should recognise and encourage these kids, and take an interest in their topics rather than expect them to be interested in other things. He also recommends reading to children of all ages, and including books from all genres.

Arts institutions face funding cut Age, 3 April, by Annabel Crabb

The federal budget could see funding for national institutions such as the National Library of Australia and the National Museum cut by removing their ability to claim depreciation on collections. The claims come after a review of government funded cultural institutions.

Another article examining this issue was in the *Bulletin* on 8 April. 'The cost of culture', by Diana Bagnall, looks at the covert nature of the recent review of cultural funding. The government says that it has undertaken the review to ensure that the public gets value for money. Diana asks what kinds of value, and has anyone asked the public.
