n 28 April 2003 family, friends and colleagues of Ian Renard gathered at the State Library of Victoria to celebrate the presentation of his Redmond Barry Award. The Redmond Barry Award is the highest honour ALIA can bestow on an individual not eligible for Associate membership.

Ian is a lawyer by profession and was a long-term partner in the Melbourne firm of Arthur Robinson & Hedderwicks. He resigned from the firm in 2001 to devote himself full-time to board and public activities.

lan has occupied a wide range of public positions, including president of the Library Board of Victoria (formerly the Council of the State Library of Victoria) from 1997 to 2002.

Ian has given unstinting service to the State Library of Victoria in particular, and to the wider community of public libraries across the state. Ian convinced the Victorian government that the rejuvenation of the State Library depended not only on completing the major building redevelopment program, but also on a significant recurrent increase to the library's annual budget.

Ian Renard is a most deserving winner of the Redmond Barry Award. It is fitting that one of the most effective lay advocates and leaders in the State Library of Victoria's long history has received an award named in honour of the State Library of Victoria's founder and first president, Redmond Barry.
