

# Lawyers agree on need for standardised global legislation

The Australian legal profession shares the strong view of their international colleagues that certain aspects of law would benefit from international standardisation, according to results from a global survey undertaken by the International Bar Association (IBA).

The survey was sponsored by legal publisher LexisNexis and conducted by the International Bar Association (IBA) on its members in Australia, Canada, France, Germany, United Kingdom and the United States.

When asked which areas of law needed to be standardised at an international level, respondents ranked laws governing money transmission and 'laundering' as being the most important. This was followed by terrorism and security, trade and investment and environmental protection. Globalisation has accelerated a need for laws to be standardised to ensure a level playing field is created for trade and investment along with acceptable definitions for environmental protection.

The release of the LexisNexis-IBA Global Legal Survey is a major initiative by Lexis-Nexis to demonstrate its global capabilities since it changed its name in Australia from Butterworths.

The LexisNexis-IBA Global Legal Survey 2003 which was jointly developed by LexisNexis and the IBA is being carried out in four parts on legal professionals worldwide covering critical topics influencing their profession. The survey will measure the impact of groundbreaking legislation, chart the progress of international law, monitor changes in practice management and gauge attorneys' opinions on key issues shaping their profession.

#### 13 Digit ISBN sunrise date announced

The formal ISO Committee Draft of the revised ISBN standard has now been sent out to national standards bodies for the first round of voting. If the revision committee's recommendations are accepted, the new style ISBN will come into use on 1 January 2007.

The most substantial change is the extension of the ISBN from 10 to 13 digits, incorporating the EAN.UCC prefix which is already used to form the barcode.

If approved, the change will affect virtually everyone in the book supply chain. Publishers, distributors, wholesalers, booksellers, libraries and any other organisations that record, store or exchange ISBNs will have to ensure that their systems can accommodate and read the 13 digit ISBN by January 2007.

Also, for the first time, there will be a core set of descriptive metadata elements, based on ONIX, associated with the ISBN and required from publishers when registering ISBNs.

#### Patent granted for ELiMS in Australia

ST LogiTrack Pte Ltd and the National Library Board of Singapore have been jointly awarded a patent by Commonwealth of Australia Patent Office for its Electronics Library Management System (ELiMS).

ELiMS has been in operation for the last four years. The system currently handles more than 30 million transactions annually with eight million tagged items in circulation in the various libraries of its customers, including libraries for two councils in Australia; Baulkham Hills Shire Council in Sydney and Adelaide City Council.
