With much discussion and through the results of a survey taken at the successful New Librarian's Symposium in December 2002, the members of NGPAG prioritised the goals to ensure that Initiative K is achieved.

What has been most pleasing is that the priorities originally set by the members of NGPAG match the results of the survey taken at the New Librarians Symposium [see http://alia.org.au/governance/committees/ new.generation/ for the survey results]. The group has prepared plans for targeted continuing professional development activities, developing a New Graduates Group, mentoring, building a dedicated website for new and recent graduates, and ensuring library and information industry presence at career days, expos and information sessions.

Many ALIA members would have noticed the flurry of activity on the New Graduates Group e-list. This has been a huge success with 152 members joining in the first few months. There have been some wonderful discussions about industry issues and sharing of information — even offers of work placements!
