How can you get started? ALIA has a number of groups covering various interest areas [http://www.alia.org.au/groups.html] These groups only succeed through the creativity and energy of their members. A great starting point could be joining the ALIA New Graduates Group (NGG). The NGG is an initiative of the ALIA New Generation Policy and Advisory Group. The aim of the NGG is to assist in the transition from student to being an active member of the library and information profession. Membership of the group is open to all ALIA members, including librarians, techni-

cians and anyone interested in the support and development of new graduates.

When the group was established an elist [aliaNEWGRAD] was also created. aliaNEWGRAD is the main communication forum for the group. It is a place to share ideas, discuss industry issues, promote CPD activities, and much more. Work on the group's website is also progressing. The pages currently contain further information about the group, contact details of the committee members and links of interest. In the future we are hoping to add information about various career paths.

This sounds daunting, but really it is about creating a support group or network of peers that you can discuss industry and work issues with, an environment in which you can bounce ideas or problems off people who may be in a similar situation. Another way of getting involved in the ALIA New Graduates Group is by contacting the committee members with any suggestions or ideas you have for activities or initiatives that you think would be of benefit to new graduates. This can be particularly rewarding as you can work with the group to make your ideas a reality.

I hope that you are feeling energised, enthused and inspired. When it comes to considering those New Year resolutions, why not add 'professional involvement' to the list, and join the ALIA New Graduates Group. It is a lot easier to achieve than losing weight or saving money!
