Amazon.com launched its 'search inside the book' service in October which allows users to search the full-text of 120 000 books for a particular name or phrase. The service is limited to registered Amazon.com users, and 'only' 120 000 books so far have been digitised. Users can view two pages on either side of the citation and cannot print the results. Levy says that the advances being made by Amazon.com and others, such as Google, are 'harbingers of a new kind of history, where the world's information is not only more plentiful and diverse, but astonishingly accessible.'
