The records of World War Two service men and women have been transferred to the National Archives of Australia (NAA). The Department of Veterans Affairs transferred between 1.2 and 1.3 million dossiers, spanning Army, Navy and Air Force records to the NAA. The Department has also created an online database containing basic biographical details of each person. The site includes a search engine capable of searching by name, service number, honours received, place of birth, place of enlistment or town or suburb on enlistment form. 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
