## LISEKA update

he LISEKA framework has two core components — ALIA as a standards body for recognition of qualifications, and continuing professional development. The ALIA Board of Directors is committed to these two aspects of LISEKA, and is working on strategies to achieve useful and meaningful outcomes.

While the Board of Education is no more, course recognition continues to be an essential role carried out by ALIA. Universities and other academic institutions are assessed on a regular basis regarding their library and information courses. However, as with all things, ways of doing this can change, and ALIA has had preliminary discussions with various academic institutions about reviewing the course recognition process. Issues discussed include university and Australian Universities Quality Agency requirements, the amount and type of documentation ALIA requires and how graduate qualities relate to ALIA's core knowledge statement. Feedback about courses from students, recent gradates and employers is important and a mechanism for continuing this is needed. University staff have expressed a wish to forge closer links between educators, employers and practitioners and believe that this is a role that ALIA can and should fulfil. There is no intention that current standards should be compromised, but there may be ways to streamline the process, and that is what is currently being discussed.
