ALIA Health Libraries Australia/Swets Professional Envoy Award for 2004

LIA Health Libraries Australia (HLA) and Swets Information Services are pleased to announce that Sue Rockliff, senior librarian at The Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Adelaide, is the inaugural recipient of the ALIA HLA/Swets Professional Envoy Award for 2004. The Award, sponsored by Swets Information Services, is a biennial award that recognises a health library and information professional who demonstrates significant achievement, a commitment to continuing excellence and/or leadership in the provision of health information in Australia. The Award enables the recipient to travel outside of Australia to investigate significant developments or recent innovations in health and biomedical libraries and information services.

The Award has been conferred upon Sue Rockliff in recognition of her leading role in the inception and development of the 'Chasing the Sun' project. This project, in the first instance, is a collaborative virtual reference service between the South Australian Human Services Libraries Consortium and the South West Information for Clinical Effectiveness network of the National Health Service in the United Kingdom, It envisages the creation of an after-hours virtual reference service for critical patient care questions by taking advantage of global time zones to offer out of business hours support for clinicians seeking urgently needed information. The aim is to broaden participation amongst other English speaking regions of the world to strengthen the project's continuity and depth of available reference expertise.

The award committee was impressed by the project's imaginative application of existing technology to offer an information

service of direct and immediate benefit to clinicians and patient care through international collaboration by health librarians. The 'Chasing the Sun' project has potentially far reaching ramifications for Australian health libraries by offering clinical information, regardless of time or geographical constraints, and in enhancing the international role of Australian health librarians.

The Award will be used by Sue to assist in funding her attendance at the Canadian Health Libraries Conference in St John, Newfoundland where she will be giving presentations on the 'Chasing the Sun' project and holding discussions on possible Canadian involvement in this project. Congratulations to Sue for receiving the inaugural Professional Envoy Award, and for setting a high standard for future Awards.
