ALIA's premier awards

Nominations are now being called for the following research awards of the Australian Library and Information Association

HCL Anderson Award

The HCL Anderson Award is the Association's highest honour that can be bestowed on an Associate member of ALIA. It is awarded in recognition of outstanding service to the library and information profession in Australia, to ALIA, or to the theory of library and information science or to the practice of library and information services. Applicants are required to be financial members of ALIA. This award is peer-nominated.

Redmond Barry Award

The Redmond Barry Award is the Association's highest honour that can be bestowed on an individual not eligible for associate or technician membership of the Association. It is awarded in recognition of outstanding service to or promotion of a library and information service or libraries and information services, or to the theory or practice of library and information science, or an associated field.

Nominees do not need to be a member of the Association. This award is peer-nominated.

Ellinor Archer Pioneer Award

The Ellinor Archer Pioneer Award recognises pioneering work in new areas of library and information science.

This may involve a one-off product, a new service or program or development of an existing service, but must incorporate a future-oriented approach. Nominees may be individual or institutional members of the Association.

The nomination may identify a specific group or unit within an institution. This award is peer-nominated.
