

The innovative conference brought together librarians from more than seventy countries and representatives of their government delegations to the Summit to discuss ways of advancing the information society globally.

Hailing its success, Alex Byrne noted that 'It shows that the worldwide network of libraries is at the heart of the information society. Over 2.5 billion users, more than the 1.6 billion mobile phone users, find the information for their lives, education, health and prosperity through our libraries.
