n Friday 3 September 2004 at 11:00am (AEST) schools, libraries and pre-schools and early-child-hood centres from Broome to Hobart joined in the reading of the picture book, *Muddled-up farm* to more than 250 000 Australian children.

Reverend Bill Crews, superintendent chairman, from the Exodus Foundation had a captive audience of Year 2 students from Darlington Public School, when he joined people from around Australia in National Simultaneous Storytime 2004.

The Exodus Foundation, based in Ashfield in Sydney, assists homeless and abandoned youth and other people in need. Since 1996, Exodus has been operating a Tutorial Centre for youth who are so
