Speakers

In the December 2003 issue of inCite we profiled two of the conference's keynote speakers: Mr Bob Hayward, senior vice president of Gartner, and Professor Martin Nakata, director of Indigenous Academic Programs at the University of Technology Sydney. This month we introduce Professor Glyn

Professor Glyn Davis has been vice-chancellor Griffith University since January 2002. He was previously



director-general of the Department of Premier and Cabinet in Oueensland. a member of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority and a director of the Southbank Corporation.

Professor Davis holds first class honours in political science from the University of New South Wales and a doctorate from the Australian National University. He was a 1987-88 Harkness Fellow in the United States, working at the University of California Berkeley, the Brookings Institution in Washington and the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

Glyn Davis joined Griffith University as a lecturer in 1985, teaching politics and public policy and, subsequently, working as an Australian Research Council Fellow. He was appointed a professor of the University in 1998, before taking leave to head the Department of Premier and Cabinet. During several secondments from Griffith, Professor Davis held a range of senior posts with the Queensland State Government. From 1995 to 1996 he was director-general of the Office of the Cabinet, and from 1990 commissioner for public sector equity with the Public Sector Management Commission.

Professor Davis was made a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) on Australia Day 2002. In the same vear he was awarded the Centenary Medal in recognition of his contribution to public service.
