## Victoria's first rail-side library

#### Commuters borrow books at Frankston train station

rankston Library Service has launched Victoria's first book lending service for commuters from Frankston train station

The service, called *Frankston Library express* enables commuters travelling on the Frankston line to browse and borrow books Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6:30am to 8:30am.

Mayor, Councillor Cathy Wilson, applauded the initiative: 'We are bringing books out of the library to make borrowing easy, convenient and accessible. I know that many people commuting to Melbourne will appreciate this type of service. Special acknowledgement and thanks is also extended to the Frankston train station staff for their support and provision of a storage facility for the books.'

Frankston Library Service manager Heather Phillips said that this was first library service of its type in Victoria. 'Our aim is to bring books to people who find that they just don't have enough time to browse and borrow a book at the library. Frankston Library express has been designed to provide a quick selection and borrowing process for people on the move.'

At the launch, library staff set up a portable library desk with a laptop computer and portable shelving to reveal 300 books.

The response to the new service has been very encouraging. Twenty-nine new members signed for library membership

on the first morning. Combined borrowings over the first two days totalled fifty-one books to forty-five people. The feedback from users has been very positive and more and more people have been asking for library membership forms.

Commuters found a wide range of titles including romance, suspense/thriller, crime/mystery, classics, general fiction and general interest (non-fiction) such as Bill Bryson A walk in the woods, Michael Moore Stupid white men, Peter Fitzsimons Nancy Wake, Australian sports writing 2003, as well as fiction by popular authors Matthew Reilly, Nora Roberts, Dennis Lehane, John Grisham,

Monica McInerney, James Lee Burke, and J A Nance.
