Cuban librarians convicted of being 'dangerous'

ensitive to growing international concern over reports of human rights violations, in late April the government of President Fidel Castro conducted a secret trial of two Cuban librarians, Elio Enrique Chávez and Luis Elio de la Paz, and sentenced them to prison on a charge of 'dangerousness'.

The two librarians are registered delegates to the Assembly to Promote a Civil Society, a conference of more than 300 non-governmental organisations scheduled to convene in Havana on 20 May. If the civil assembly takes place, it will be the first nationwide public meeting of non-governmental organisations held in Cuba since the establishment of the Castro regime in 1959. Alarmed by the prospect of this unprecedented challenge to its authority, the government is using threats and arrests to prevent the assembly from taking place and is pressuring member organisations to revoke their support for the gathering.

The hundreds of organisations planning to meet in Havana for the assembly are regarded as illegal by the Cuban regime, which refuses to recognise the existence of civic groups outside its control. Among the associations planning to attend the conference are several networks of independent libraries, organised since 1998 in an innovative project to offer public access to uncensored books.

Elio Enrique Chávez is the director of the 20th of May Library, and his cousin Luis Elio de la Paz is the director of the 10th of October Library. After being convicted of 'dangerousness', Chávez and de la Paz were sentenced, respectively, to two and three years in prison.

Cuba's independent librarians are being persecuted, and more than a dozen librarians arrested in a massive round-up in 2003 have been adopted as 'prisoners of conscience' by Amnesty International, which is demanding their immediate release.
