Clarence Campus Library wins LEP Excellence Award

Libraries doing what they do so well — connecting their clients to information — was showcased in the entries for the inaugural Library Extension Program (LEP) Excellence Award. This annual award recognises and rewards libraries for excellence in raising the awareness, understanding and informed use of ABS information in their communities. 'The ABS appreciates the guiding role librarians play in helping their communities to find and use reliable information,' said the Australian Statistician, Dennis Trewin.

A library that is outstanding in helping its clients to use ABS information for their research was the Award winner, TAFE Tasmania's Clarence Campus Library. The prize — a trophy and \$1500 worth of ABS products and services of the library's choice — was presented by Dennis Trewin in Hobart.

Leanne Vincent, the campus librarian, said '[Our students] are the social workers of the future, and discovering the ABS for them will be a lifelong discovery. They can see the value of the products, not just for their studies, but when they go out into the workforce. The LEP unit and local LEP co-ordinator play an important role here. The LEP Newsletters keep me informed of new products, and of ways that other libraries are promoting ABS products.'

Award judges were impressed with the wide range of activities aimed at increasing the knowledge and awareness of ABS information. Different audiences were targeted, including new students, course students, staff and subject-specific classes. Judges commended the library's 'commitment to lifelong learning practices' and its strong initiative for long-term ABS awareness.
