The one-day forum, on 19 September 2006, will be a satellite event for the ALIA 2006 biennial conference at the Perth Convention Centre.

The themes for 'Library stars: best of the best' reflect the 'CLICK' theme for the ALIA 2006 Biennial conference.

- How do public libraries create value?
- How do they lead debate on literacy, reading and access to information?
- What innovations are occurring?
- How do libraries connect with their communities?
- Sharing knowledge with colleagues

Call for nominations for presentations

The PLRG invites nominations from the public library sector for presentations showcasing a library or a project or success achieved by a public library service.

From the nominations, the PLRG will select up to seven presentations that reflect the 'best of the best' across Australia's diverse public library services. Individuals or library services may nominate. Presenters will need to be self-funded, but will be eligible for free registration. In the forum program, 30 minutes will be allowed for each

presentation. Delegates to the forum will vote for the Delegates' Choice Award for the best project presented on the day.

To nominate a library service, project or success, please send a proposal of up to 300 words including:

- · a brief description;
- how one or more of the above themes are addressed; and
- why you believe it is a 'library star'.

Include full contact details: the name or names of presenter/s, job title/s, organisation name and address and the e-mail address and phone number of the contact person for the nomination.

The PLRG will select the presentations, inform those shortlisted and finalise the forum program by mid-April 2006.
