Libraries for Christmas

he Renaissance Library Calendar contains colour photographs of 12 wonderful old libraries, built between 597AD and 1838. They were selected from nominations by library and information professionals and book lovers in more than 40 countries.

The 2006 edition — the sixth — shows libraries from 11 countries: Austria, Belgium, Germany, Italy (2), Mexico, the Netherlands, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, the United Kingdom and the USA. It is published by ISIM of Stockholm, Sweden.

Two libraries in the calendar were honoured with UNESCO awards in July 2005. Biblioteca Palafoxiana, (the Palafoxiana Library) in Puebla, Mexico, and the Plantin-Moretus Museum in Antwerp, Belgium.

Biblioteca Palafoxiana is the only surviving library in America from the colonial period. The library, built in 1646, has in its collection material from 1473 to 1910. It includes 42 000 volumes, 9 incunabula and over 5000 manuscripts. It ws listed in the UNESCO 'Memory of the World' International Register.

The Plantin-Moretus Museum, in Antwerp, is a printing plant and publishing house dating back to the Renaissance and Baroque periods. It is named after the great printer–publisher, Christophe Plantin (c.1520–1589). The museum contains an extensive library, a large collection of old printing equipment, and invaluable archives and works of art. It is of outstanding architectural value.
