ANZAC commemoration in the library

cluded, as many defence force personnel started out as Cub Scouts.

Inspired by the display, our students asked many interesting questions: Has the man died? Whose clothing was now on display? What were the medals for? How come the man was so tiny? Is he an old man now? The uniform is a Petty Officer's uniform and is for a



small mans fitting (SM)! Of course, it was not that unusual for teenagers as young as 16 to volunteer for army and naval duty. Many students thought that it was only much older men who went to war. They hadn't realised that so many youths lost their lives. It was explained that it was an honour and a duty for these men and women to serve their country.

This themed display was a huge success with both our primary and secondary students. It led to many students investigating further and researching the story of ANZAC and Australia's involvement in war.

country to develop its own Country Gateway.

This round of funding will provide continued support for all programs, including aid management tools, e-government programs, online communities of development learning, and support of country gateway portals providing web-related services for local development needs.Funds will be directed towards the public procurement websites in the Asia-Pacific region, enabling online publishing of government procurement information such as tender notices. contract awards and bidding documents. It will allow major savings in government spending while giving companies greater access to tender opportunities.
