IFLA PAC

International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions Core Activity on Preservation and Conservation

FLA (http://www.ifla.org/index.htm) is a worldwide, independent, non-government organisation with a membership of over 1300 libraries and library associations in more than 130 countries. The aims of IFLA are to promote international co-operation, discussion, and research in all fields of library activity IFLANET (http://www.ifla.org/III/intro00.htm). IFLA has several core activities that cover internationally important issues. One of these is PAC (Preservation and Conservation). Other activities of IFLA include the annual IFLA World Library and Information Congress, held in Seoul, Korea, in 2006.

IFLA PAC (IFLA Core Activity on Preservation and Conservation, http://www.ifla.org/VI/4/pac.htm) was established in 1986. The purpose of IFLA PAC is to focus efforts on issues of preservation and initiate worldwide co-operation for the preservation of library materials (http://www.ifla.org/VI/4/pac.htm). The PAC core program consists of 9 regional centres based in various National Libraries throughout the world. The international centre or focal point is the Bibliotheque nationale de France. The National Library of Australia is the Regional Centre for Oceania and Southeast Asia, and the Regional Centre for Asia is the National Diet Library in Japan.

The aims of the PAC core program are to

 Raise awareness of preservation issues, emphasising the key role of preservation

- in the global management of library collections.
- Develop a policy of co-ordinated activities with PAC Centres, IFLA structures and other organisations or individuals interested in the preservation of documentary heritage.
- Encourage scientific research on the causes, prevention and treatment of the deterioration of library documents, the reformatting of information, and the development of national and international standards that support the preservation of library materials.
- Educate library staff at all levels on preservation practices and encourage the organisation of practical training programs (http://www.ndl.go.jp/en/iflapac/pdf/BrochureIFLAPAC.pdf).

IFLA PAC outreach activities include publication of *International Preservation News* (IPN, see http://www.ifla.org/VI/4/ipn.html) and *International Preservation Issues* (IPI, http://www.ifla.org/VI/4/ipi.html). Conferences and workshops are held regularly. IFLA PAC recently co-sponsored a symposium, 'The 3 Ds of Preservation: Disasters, Displays, Digitization', which was held at the Bibliothèque nationale de France in March 2006.

Why do we need IFLA PAC?

A practical example of IFLA PAC at work is the development of the 'Training in Preservation Microfilming' package. The National Library of Australia, in collaboration with the State Library of South Australia and under the auspices of IFLA PAC, produced the training package. It comprises 10 modules, 6 wall charts, a logbook, a learning guide, a glossary/index and a small kit of practical training aids. The training material was written by Heather Brown, Assistant Director at Artlab Australia, and is the result of an IFLA PAC survey on microfilming training needs in the Southeast Asia and Pacific region conducted in 2001. The material is available in several formats, including CD ROM, hardcopy or pdf. More details can be found on the NLA website at http://www.nla.gov.au/preserve/ trainmat.html.

It is through initiatives such as this that IFLA PAC provides access to standards, guidelines and best practices in preservation and conservation of library, information and cultural heritage materials.
