CSA's search engine wins CODIE award

MultiSearch, the federated searching solution from CSA using MuseGlobal technology, has been presented with the Software and Information Industry Association's 21st Annual CODIE Award for Best Solution Integrating Content into an Application.

Print a daily newspaper in the library from ProQuest

ProQuest Information and Learning has announced the introduction of ND Press, a new service enabling librarians to print reference copies of daily newspapers from around the world directly in the library. ProQuest will distribute ND Press to public, academic, government and corporate libraries worldwide.

ND Press, a service by NewspaperDirect, prints exact newspaper replicas of more than 330 titles from 60 countries in 36 languages. ND Press supports academic research particularly in the fields of international studies, political science and business. It also serves a public library's diverse population by providing access to newspapers from around the world the same day the paper is released.

ND Press has a broad selection of prominent titles such as Le Monde, Frankfurter Allegemaine Zeitung, El Pais, and Mainichi Shimbun, as well as key titles from the United States including the Los Angeles Times, The Boston Globe, Chicago Tribune, and The Washington Post. ND Press allows newspapers to be printed from multiple workstations to any networked printers. Libraries can customise their service to have titles printed automatically or as needed.

The new service boasts a 60-day archive of past issues. Users have the option of printing the entire newspaper or individual page prints, including article text, advertisements, classifieds, and notices (varies by publication).

Innovative's next generation search tool available soon

Innovative says that Research Pro, its next-generation federated-search tool, will become available in the third quarter of 2006. Research Pro uses sophisticated technologies to provide a rich and highly usable environment for searching across library-selected resources.

The new tool provides a tabbed-browse display that groups results by target resource, harnesses AJAX (Asynchronous JavaScript and XML)

for increased fluidity and continuity of search sessions, and employs Innovative's smart-search algorithm for efficient delivery of information from subscription databases.

Research Pro makes searching easier by eliminating the need for user search-expertise. The new interface provides a clean look and easy type-and-go functionality offered by popular web search engines. Libraries can also select a set of default search targets so users won't have to decide which are best to search in a given context.

Library users can also extend this continuity by saving one or more target resources for future use in the My Millennium personalisation suite.

Deal brings books on ScienceDirect to 55 000 students across Asia Pacific

Elsevier has announced the signing of an agreement for the provision of vital scientific and medical information to Monash University. The agreement provides the 55 000 strong student community, from 10 faculties, with complete access to 35 Reference Works and 2 Handbooks covering authoritative titles from the core scientific and medical literature including such titles as Encyclopedia of Energy, Encyclopedia of Geology, Encyclopedia of Soils in the Environment, Treatise on Geochemistry, Encyclopedia of Biodiversity and the International Encyclopedia of Social & Behavioral Science.

The agreement provides the Monash University user community with access to Reference Works and Handbooks via ScienceDirect. Reference Works offer definitive reviews of their fields, via authoritative, validated content, edited by international teams of experts. The scope of these works ranges from the detailed, exhaustive coverage of specialist areas to the broad-based succinct overviews in the Encyclopedias. Via ScienceDirect, extensive browsing and advanced searching is possible across subject, thematic, alphabetical, author and cited author indexes, as well as internal cross-referencing between articles in the work, plus dynamic linking to journal articles and abstract databases, making navigation flexible and easy. In addition, Elsevier's standard 'walk-up' provision allows all citizens free access to scientific and medical information covered under these agreements.

Melbourne's Queen's College chooses Horizon

SirsiDynix has announced that Queen's College at the University of Melbourne has selected the ASP (Application Service Provider) version of the SirsiDynix Horizon library management system. SirsiDynix-certified system administrators will host the implementation and management of the system.

Queen's College, founded in 1887, is a coeducational college of the Uniting Church offering residential accommodation to undergraduate and post graduate students doing courses at the University of Melbourne, RMIT University and the Victorian College of Pharmacy. Queen's College library services are open to both residents and non-residents alike.

Tasman's journal freely available through OCLC PICA

OCLC PICA has made available for free a digital copy of a rare English translation of the journal of Abel Tasman (published in 1898) thanks to Strata Preservation and the National Archives in The Hague, who made the book available for digitisation.

Tasman discovered Tasmania in 1642 and his journal belongs to the Dutch National Archives in The Hague. A digital copy of the original journal in old Dutch is available online via the National Archives in the Netherlands. It is remarkably well illustrated with maps, drawings of coastlines as Tasman passed them on his journey, as well as of natives of the new lands and islands that he visited.

To celebrate the partnership between OCLC PICA and the National Library of Australia and the implementation of the CBS software that was taken into production in Libraries Australia last year, OCLC PICA had the original journal of Abel Tasman digitised through Strata Preservation.

Strata Preservation offers services for microfilming and digitisation of vulnerable and unique materials that libraries, archives and other cultural heritage institutions want to preserve and make accessible to the public. Apart from bulk scanning it has specialised in high-end solutions and handling rare materials. Strata Preservation is a joint-venture of OCLC PiCA and the National Library of the Netherlands.

Australian writers cash in \$1.4M

Queensland writers could win up to \$1.4million in competitions, awards and prizes, a new book launched at the Queensland Writers Centre shows in September 2006.

The Australian Writer's Marketplace, launched by Brisbane author Rebecca Sparrow reveals how unpublished and experienced writers alike can stake their claim on the prizes on offer, including awards worth up to \$84 000.

Ms Sparrow, author of *The Girl Most Likely* and *The Year Nick McGowan Came to Stay*, said the book would help writers get published quicker and make more money from their writing.
