Dynamic, colourful, surprising: Kogarah's library festival

'When will you run this festival again? It's fantastic!'

It is the question Kogarah Library staff was asked constantly by the visitors to their Library and Information Week events in May 2007. We hosted 15 activities across our three libraries for Library and Information Week 2007 that attracted 612 attendances. Our key aim in planning the week was to create a festival atmosphere in the library and to raise awareness of Library and Information Week.

We really believe libraries 'educate, inform and entertain'. Our events tackled some serious subjects, such as how to plan your future finances and how to best engage young children with books. We also had some activities that showed that the library is a place where you can have fun-like a children's party and a French cuisine cooking demonstration. An important aspect of our planning was to make the activities directly relevant to the lives of the people in our local community. The themes we chose were almost elemental: food, money, fun and information (who can live without information?). 'Food @ your library' proved the most popular activity for adults with a demonstration of French cooking by a French

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chef from a local catering school. The event was booked out two weeks before and, even so, there was standing room only.

The most popular activity for children was our Friday evening 'Space Party', attended by 79 children and their parents. The children enjoyed blasting off with an astronaut and a robot, playing games and winning prizes. An aim of the Space Party was to introduce local children to each other, as many of them live in the apartments located above and around the library building.

There were two elements in the overall success of Library Week at Kogarah Library. Firstly, we are lucky to have a fantastic venue for events and activities. Our library is just over a year old and includes a foyer and exhibition area that can seat up to 150 people. Many people came to borrow books and stayed for the events in the foyer.

Another important element was community involvement. Our series of financial planning talks were presented free by a local financial planning company. The local Kogarah Concert Band presented part of our lunchtime music program, along with a showcase of talented students from Kogarah Marist Boy's High School at the 'Young Muso's Zone'. The involvement of local people enhances the community's sense of ownership of their local library as well as keeping the budget manageable for a program of 15 activities.

We believe Library and Information Week 2007 was a terrific success. It now provides a great base for promoting future events throughout the year and creates a sense of the library as an interesting, exciting, relevant and sometimes surprising place. We hope we can build Library and Information Week into an annual 'celebration of the library' and so when asked, 'When will you run this festival again?' we can answer 'Every year ...in Library and Information Week!'
