'979' ISBNs: The International ISBN Agency has announced that it expects ISBNs with a 979 prefix will begin to be issued in the second quarter of 2008. All 13-digit ISBNs issued to date have carried the '978' prefix, which allowed systems to carry both 10- and 13-digit ISBNs. Once the '979' prefix is introduced, there can be no 10-digit equivalent, as this could lead to duplication of numbers.

The Hollywood Librarian: This film by Ann Seidl, produced by Overdue Pro-

ductions, has premiered at the American Library Association conference in front of an audience of 5,000 in Washington. The first full-length film to focus on the work and lives of librarians in the context of American movies, the documentary is interspersed with interviews with real librarians and messages of censorship, intellectual freedom, pay equity and funding.
