Mentoring in retirement

ALIA Tasmania's web page defines mentoring as a 'deliberate pairing of a more skilled or experienced person with a lesser-skilled or experienced one, with the agreed upon goal of having the lesser-skilled person grow and develop specific competencies'. Retired library and information workers can bring a wealth of knowledge to new professionals or those moving into a different area in the LIS sector.
