Education & Research

The Carrick Institute for Learning and Teaching in Higher Education — an initiative of the Australian Government Department of Education Science and Training (DEST) — was launched in August 2004. The Institute is named in honour of Sir John Carrick KCMG, former Commonwealth Minister for Education. Amongst its many activities is the Carrick Citation for Outstanding Contributions to Student Learning. This year, two Western Australian library candidates received this award:

The Murdoch University Library's Information Literacy Working Group (Merrilee Albatis, Pam Mathews, Margaret Solosy and Soun Wong) was awarded the citation for the 'development and delivery of a flexible program to enhance student information literacy, embedded within the first year degree structure'.

The group was thrilled to receive the award and the recognition it gives to the role of the Library and the LITE program in enhancing student learning — see <http:// wwwlib.murdoch.edu.au/lite/>

As a self-paced online information literacy program, LITE is accessible to all Murdoch students (internal, external and offshore) with internet access. It is designed to introduce first-year students (and students new to Murdoch) to the library and to valuable library and web research skills.

The Information Studies @ Curtin program received its citation for enhancing student learning in information studies through a commitment to flexible learning environments and the embedding of practical professional knowledge to focus the students' learning experiences. The program integrates professional practice and experience with the necessary theoretical and often historical frameworks of relevant literature and research into current, relevant, lively and professionally recognised courses. Via online technology, students in the most remote parts of the world can join with academics and fellow students in a stimulating and supportive learning environment. The diversity of students' backgrounds also facilitates consideration of issues from a variety of perspectives.
