NLA and Apex Publishing in newspaper partnership

The National Library of Australia announced that Apex Publishing's capacity to construct text-searchable files from microfilm will enable the creation of a full-text database of Australian newspapers, 1803–1954. The library expects to digitise the 19th century material first, beginning with papers such as the *Argus*, the *Sydney Gazette*, and the *Courier Mail*. Papers from Hobart, Adelaide, Perth and Darwin will also be covered. Source material is being provided in co-operation with state libraries.

New title from Auslib Press

Valerie Johnson's new book is *Life after Fenwick: The rise, fall and future of library services for children in Australia*. The author says all levels of government need to make a major investment in children's library services, which she regards as enabling access to information: a necessity of life only slightly less important than food and shelter. Levels of service are affected by funding, so Johnson reviews funding models and their effects in this historical survey. The book concentrates on services in Victoria and Tasmania in the period from 1966 (the date of the Fenwick report) to the present.
