Nominations are now being called for the following research awards of the Australian Library and Information Association

Study Grant Award

There are funds available to ALIA members wishing to undertake a study project. Study Grants are offered to provide an opportunity for librarians and library technicians to undertake projects that they would otherwise be unable to do because of the time and cost involved. Study Grants are open to practicising librarian or library technician members who have been personal members for at least two years and have a minimum of three years experience.

The number of awards in any year will depend upon the funds available and the estimated costs of proposals received.

YBP/Lindsay & Croft Research Award For Collection Services

The ALIA YBP/Lindsay & Croft Research Award for Collection Services is a biennial award that aims to increase the recipient's professional knowledge and experience; to provide the recipient with the opportunity to investigate and research a particular aspect of the development of collection services; and to encourage practice-related research or projects that will inform and advance practice in collection services and management.

Applicants are required to be financial members of ALIA.

Twila Ann Janssen Herr Research Award For Disability Services

The Twila Ann Janssen Herr research award is a biennial award which provides an early career practitioner with the opportunity to undertake a research project in the area of library and information services for people with a disability.

Applicants are required to be personal financial members of ALIA early in their career and practising in the sector.
