ALIA and **Library Technician** Educators **annual** meetings

Progress so far...

Working with LIS educators, ALIA hosts an annual forum for library technician educators to provide an opportunity for professional development, the sharing of professional ideas and experiences while building and supporting a community of practice.

In 2006 library technician educators met in Sydney to discuss the potential for the peer review of courses. Facilitated by A/Prof Gillian Hallam and Dr Paul Genoni, the forum focused on whether course design and curriculum content should determined by the National Training Package. A peer review process was proposed, allowing educators to consider how courses were resourced and delivered while exploring the range of learning activities and assessment approaches.

2007 progress

The 2007 ALIA Library Technician Educators Forum was held in Melbourne on 8 October, and workshop participants formed four groups to review four

dimensions of effective teaching, based on the conceptual framework developed by Queensland University of Technology (QUT).

These learning and teaching groups are: Engaging learners, designing for learning, assessing for learning and managing for learning.

The four dimensions are underpinned by a philosophy of learning and teaching that supports and encourages continuous improvement, the maintenance of currency of knowledge, contributing to new knowledge, the collection of feedback, reflection and analysis, improvement of practice, contributing to communities of practice and the dissemination of outcomes.

Where to from here in 2008

The 2008 Library Technician Educators Forum will be held in Sydney on 24 October and will include discussions on The National Museums and Library/Information Services Training Package. ALIA has had significant input into the development of the training package

with a further review being proposed.

It is expected that the groups will continue to expand upon outcomes of the 2007 workshop, further reviewing the relevant dimension of teaching in order to develop a set of elements and goals that are appropriate for library technician courses. The group will also be asked to examine the requirements of the Australian Quality Training Framework to determine the degree of alignment and/or overlap, so that the ALIA course recognition process can in turn be aligned with the TAFE quality assurance processes. As a final step, the groups are being asked to consider how the goals, together with achievement towards those goals, might be measured.

ALIA is committed to the annual meetings with LT educators, as this offers an opportunity to consider any important issues relating to course recognition.

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
