Free Municipal Libraries in South Australia celebrate 50 years

Elizabeth Public Library, the first free municipal library in South Australia marked its 50th anniversary on 11th December 2007.

Establishment of the Library took a mere six weeks from the time the proposal was put to Council by the State Library, to the day of opening in 1957. Community enthusiasm for the library exceeded expectations. Sir Thomas Playford officially opened the Library and 480 members signed up on the first day with 952 books lent. Community response was so great that extra staff and books were rushed out from the State Library in Adelaide.

By the fourth day 1,120 people had joined the library and by the end of the month 1,524 had become members.

The library service has undergone a number of moves and transformations over the last 50 years, including the amalgamation of two local government areas. In 2004 the City of Playford Library Service relocated into two new purpose built sites, one at the Elizabeth Civic Centre, the other a youth focused shop front library in Munno Para Shopping City. Library membership now stands at 50,688 out of a population of 73,000.

Celebrations for the anniversary kicked off with a formal cocktail party in the Great Hall of the Playford Civic Centre on the 15th November, 2007. Representatives of the Libraries Board and PLS were in attendance with special guest Mr Warwick Dunstan, the very first City Librarian. Other library staff, past and present joined the celebrations, along with Council staff, the Mayor, community members, Library managers from across South Australia and others who have supported and nurtured public libraries in the state.

A community birthday party was held on Saturday 17^{th} November with long term library members joining in the celebration which culminated in the cutting of a birthday cake by Warwick Dunstan.

The anniversary has provided a valuable opportunity for current library staff to reflect upon the past as we head for towards the future, becoming aware that we 'stand on the shoulders of giants'. It was particularly inspiring to learn of the innovation and vision of Warwick Dunstan in driving the development of the Elizabeth library service and state wide initiatives such as centralised indexing of periodicals.

The City of Playford Public Library Service continues the commitment of providing a dynamic, responsive and inclusive library service for all members of our community and we eagerly move into the next 50 years with great expectations and verve.

Some other initiatives adopted were a library timeline depicting the achievements from 1922 to the present, a slideshow to be projected throughout the event, providing a native tree as a gift for attendees as well as a historical display of Library artifacts.

VIPs, former Library staff and managers, colleagues, clients and dedicated champions of the library service attended the event which was heralded as a great success. Amongst the guests was the Queensland Minister of Primary Industries and Fisheries, the Honorable

Scriven (1904 -1924) in setting up the library and employing Comte Gontran de Tournouer in 1922 as the first librarian.

The staff of the Library is to be congratulated for their combined effort. It was unanimously agreed that the exercise had been one of the most effective team building activities of recent times. Staff is now reinvigorated and looking towards our next milestone, the EcoSciences Precient in 2010.
