VALA 2008: Libraries/Changing Spaces, Virtual Places

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Well I'm back in my office, reviewing my notes, looking over the business

cards I exchanged and fondling the goodies I collected at the exhibition to give as presents to the staff I left behind. What an exhausting, but exhilarating VALA experience I had as a first time delegate.

There were some outstanding presentations throughout conference especially from some of the keynote speakers. One of my favourites was Peter Lor's (Secretary General of IFLA) presentation on International Librarianship 2.0: some international dimensions of Web 2.0 and Library 2.0. Speaking about the flow of information in developing countries, he also outlined some of the issues facing our sector including 'brain drain' and the unfair exploitation of indigenous knowledge.

Terence Harrison of Royal Melbourne Hospital collaborated with Catherine Voutier of the Centre of Clinical Effectiveness, Monash Medical Centre in Melbourne, to bring together Terence's Blog on clinical evidence issues and Catherine's Wiki on clinical evidence resources. The result (which they have called a Bliki) is Exploring the Evidence Base which includes a categorised list of resources in the Wiki section and discussion topics with the facility to comment and collaborate in the Blog section.

Professor Schubert Foo presented some of the initiatives the National Library of Singapore has taken to meet its users in their own spaces and provide an enhanced library experience, while Luke Wroblewski from Yahoo gave an outstanding plenary session on the last day. He spoke about web design patterns and introduced a number of tools that were new to me, including Rollyo, where you can create a search engine that searches only the sites and blogs of interest. Luke also spoke about Renkoo invite, a tool that enables the user to plan an event from the start, by using a variety of technology platforms including SMS, instant messenger and It was impossible to see all the excellent presentations, so I would like to thank my conference buddies: Debb Zott, Kylie Jarrett, Alison Carter and Pam Cunningham who regaled me with their favourite moments of the conference while writing this report.
