The 2008 Biennial Conference program is in the final stages of being crafted into a work of art and will be available soon on the conference web page. Building on the *dreaming08* theme, the program will feature a range of papers and posters across a variety of sectors and topics of interest to our profession. They will include: workforce planning, research, access, children and youth, and the arts just to name a few. With more than 60 oral presentations and approximately 20 posters, there is bound to be something for everyone!



Host city Alice Springs has a proud indigenous culture, which will be reflected throughout the conference. The Australian Government's formal apology to the Stolen Generation has stirred an interest in indigenous issues, and a number of presentations will include indigenous content.

There will be more oral presentations than there have been at previous biennial conferences, and in addition there will also be a poster session which will form an important part of the professional program of this conference. This session will be particularly useful for first time presenters as well as provide a great opportunity for those starting out on a research project, to discuss ideas and issues with professional colleagues.

Our line-up of keynote speakers is now complete with each keynoter addressing a different issue within our industry, reflecting a variety of viewpoints both from within Australia as well as overseas. From Australia and focusing on Indigenous themes, there will be Professor Martin Nakata, Chair of Australian Indigenous Education & Director of Jumbunna Indigenous House of Learning at the University of Technology, Sydney; Anita Heiss, who is an author, poet, satirist, social commentator, and current Chair of the Australian Society of Authors; from the US we will have Lorie Roy, 2007–2008 President of the American Library Association and Professor in the School of Information, the University of Texas at Austin; Stephen Abram, Vice President, Innovation, SirsiDynix, USA; from Sweden, there will be Inga Lundén, Director of the Stockholm Public Library; and from Germany, Claudia Lux, President of IFLA and Director General of the Foundation Central and Regional Library Berlin.
