What is that book worth?

Recently a discussion occurred within TAFENSW around the future of a valuable and rare book.

Different libraries made different decisions about how to proceed (place in Reference, Special (closed) reserve, label the book as expensive, include an indication for library staff on checkout so they can inform that student).

TAFE libraries do not collect for original research or repository requirements – a book with restricted or no borrowing lessens the value to the student who wishes to use it. Placing a label on the book indicating value will only increase the likelihood of theft and possible damage. Is an item ever so valuable to a library with no repository responsibilities it is worth protecting over making it as widely available as possible?

If the book is worth \$1000 and goes out 20 times, each borrowing cost \$50 and so on. If the book never goes out then the cost of the book is \$1000 and never changes. If students are made aware at the point of borrowing of the cost of damage or loss and they do take it then there can be no dispute about the resulting bill.

When we judge the value of a book (or indeed video, DVD, or other resource) should we be just looking at the dollar value or is there a bigger picture?
