Library staff have to make sure that they maximise the use of the library facilities in order to provide environments conducive to learning, in whatever way that might be defined by future learners. In other words, give the people what they want! After all, libraries only exist because they have patrons/users/clients that use their facilities, products, and services.

Coordinating events and workshops to achieve information and technology literacy among the users is one of the many important roles that librarians will need to take on in the future. No doubt such tasks are being acted upon already, but I believe they will become an increasingly larger element of the LIS professional role.

Lastly, in my dream, the L word is no longer used. The word 'library' actually comes from the Latin word libre or libri meaning book.
