When the Robertson Library building was officially opened in September 1972, the five-storey brick and concrete structure dominated the newly established Western Australian Institute of Technology's Bentley campus, now Curtin University.

Curtin Library is celebrating this 40th milestone with a new web resource, Robertson Library: 40 years at the heart of Curtin (http://john.curtin.edu. au/40thanniversary/index.html). In the past four decades, the building has undergone physical extensions and interior renovations and the library has transformed its operations from labour-intensive work practices to providing increasingly online services. Today, Robertson Library is still a leading facility on campus in the provision of learning spaces that reflect the essential elements of place, people, collections, and technology.

The resource provides a valuable historical insight into the development of libraries with a multitude of photographs illustrating changes to facilities, collections, library operations, and services. Librarians, both new and established, can explore each decade in depth:

The 1970s – an era of manual selection, purchase, cataloguing, and processing of materials, and a workload of managing more than 140 000 loans a year via date stamps, book pockets, and borrower cards.

The 1980s – the introduction of journal indexing databases, expensive librarian-facilitated online searches, and the first desktop personal computers for staff use.

The 1990s – an era of expansion with the long awaited extensions to the building being

completed, the launch of an online catalogue, implementation of a commercial library management system, and the creation of electronic content such as digital theses and expanding e-Reserve collection.

The 2000s – perceptions of the purpose and uses of Robertson Library underwent a paradigm shift with a sense of place predominating and the electronic delivery of resources and services prevailing.
